
Teacher's Guide for *Iva Honeysuckle Discovers*the World



Making a Book Map

Iva finds a treasure map that belonged to her great-grand-grandfather Ludwell. There is gold hidden somewhere in Uncertain, Virginia, where Iva lives! But reading the map isn't easy.

One way to learn to read a map is to have students map the books they've read throughout the school year. Mount a large map of North America on the wall and place sticky write-on arrow pads nearby. Have students write the book title and their name on a sticky arrow, and place it where the book was set.

Mapping a Day

Not all maps are of places. Have students create a map of their day, using words and symbols or drawings. They'll be surprised how busy their days are.
