Can Animals Predict the Weather? 3-ESS2-2

Sam tells Maddie that his cat Abraham can predict the weather. Maddie wonders if this is true. Animals can give us clues about changing weather. Who has noticed birds eating at a feeder just before it snows? Or a dog stretched out flat when it's hot?

Animals have sharper senses than humans, particularly the sense of smell and hearing. Some animals can smell rain miles away, scientists say.

When snow or rain or a thunderstorm is predicted, ask students to watch birds and animals. Do they behave differently? Write down the results.
